

The <u>mission</u> of the Children's Advocacy Centers of Illinois (CACI), a chapter of the National Children's Alliance, supports and promotes Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs) through leadership, education and collaboration.

In Illinois, our <u>vision</u> is simple: to ensure every child in the state of Illinois has access to the services offered through a CAC. While we cannot stop abuse, we can make a significant impact through prevention education and multidisciplinary services provided to the children who have suffered the horrors of abuse.

Illinois remains one of the top states in the nation in the number of operating children's advocacy centers, serving child victims of sexual and physical abuse and non-offending family members. There are 37 CACs in Illinois serving 98 out of 102 counties.

In FY18, **12,424** child victims walked through the doors of a CAC in Illinois to receive a forensic interview & follow up services for them <u>AND</u> their family. During that time CACI continued to increase services and its ability to support CACs. We also provided 28 trainings to 951 participants and coordinated 42 peer reviews!

Once again, we are humbled and thankful to have Erin take on such an awesome task and from the very bottom of our hearts, we ask that you join her!

Dr. Rav Davis will cover:


- ☐ Child abuse reporting and statistics

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The use of data has never been more prevalent in our society. Child Advocacy Centers across the country can and are utilizing the benefits of this. While data can be used to track case information from cradle to grave – (intake to conviction), data analytics can be used as a tool to forecast potential outcomes, support decision making and improve collaboration among family, care-


givers, case workers, service providers, and law enforcement. Analytics and a can improve how your organization listens, learns, and makes decisions.

It is also important to note that data analytics are an invaluable tool for obtaining and potentially increasing grant funding. As you know, obtaining grant funding is a competitive process. The use of predictive analytics can easily provide an edge to your organization. Data allows you to tell your story, visually showing your strengths and where your needs are within the agency, and when asking for additional resources data will allow you to "prove the need." For the grant reviewer data provides relevant qualitative data and context for the numbers provided.

In the future it will become ever more crucial to bridge the gap between data and strategy.

The future of data is very exciting.


